April showers bring May flowers. Well we really didn't get a lot of showers, but those dang green inch worms and their webs sure caused a lot of damage. Hope all have recovered and are ready for a dynamic closeout of the Lions Year.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING and WORLDWIDE INDUCTION DAY: Saturday April 16th was our Worldwide Induction Day and District Leadership Training. I was encouraged by the six new members, but more importantly by those new & old officers that showed up for training. There were lessons learned by all and we will endeavor to push ahead at the Fall Conference.

STATE CONVENTION: One of the indicators that the year is coming to a close is the annual State Convention. This year it will be held at the Hotel Roanoke, Roanoke Virginia, 19-22 May. Registration forms and additional information is available at <u>http://www.e-district.org/sites/md24/page</u>8.php.

LOVF RAFFLE: LOVF is the club's disaster insurance policy and that policy paid off for two clubs after three tornadoes struck our District in February. Two \$10,000 grants provided the emergency assistance needed in our community. LOVF needs our help in order to be prepared to help us in our time of need. The raffle is the primary fund raiser for LOVF and on top of that, clubs keep \$2 for every \$3 sold. It is a win-win for everyone. Please do what you can to sell those tickets. District officers (Zone, Region, Secretary, Treasurer, VDGs, and DG) will be happy to collect and turn-in your stubs, unsold tickets, and check at the State Convention.

MD24 ACHIEVEMENT AWARD: Get recognized for achieving excellence in your club by applying for the MD24 State Achievement Award. The requirements are many, but clubs that meet them are amongst the few in the state that earn this award. Clubs must submit the application through the Zone Chairman who must forward the application to the District Governor by 25 July 2016. 2016/2017 OFFICERS: Clubs need to submit the officers for next year. Currently 38 clubs have submitted the required information.

WHITE CANE: Some call it pan-handling, some call it begging, but no matter what you call it, it generates funds for clubs. Given the right location, at the right time, it can help a club. 16 clubs have conducted 25 White Cane Fund Raisers over 46 days. They raised nearly \$22,000, or \$880 per event, or \$480 per day. Another way to look at it is 238 Lions spent a total of 830 hours earning \$26.50 per Lion-hour. (Data as of 31 March)

MEMBERSHIP: End of year house cleaning began early as we dropped 11 members, which was off-set by 11 new members. The district is still a **+31** for the year. Membership growth is a continual process that you can't do on a whim. It takes prior planning and work and it starts by asking potential members. Let's also not forget to keep the members we have. Retention is key to our survival as a community service organization and the key to retention is interesting & inviting service projects. Serve your community and keep the members you have.

I hope to see you at State Convention later in the month and then the final District Meeting on June 8th.

Hello Lions!

This month I'd like to start by asking a simple question.

Where is your Lions Sign?

You know the one I'm talking about; they typically adorn other, larger signs that welcome you as you pass from one of the seven cities to another. You'll see them in the median of a boulevard or off to the side of the road. They usually share a space with the Rotarians, Kiwanis and other service organizations. The reason I ask has a lot to do with our legacy, everything in fact. That's why the Centennial Community Legacy Project is so important. As we approach 100 years of Lionism it's very important to take an outsiders look at our Lions clubs. WE know all the good work we do and so do the individuals and families we help. Heck you're reading our newsletter right now, District 24-D is at your fingertips... but the community at large, (many of them in need of our service!) don't really know we're here. Those of us who live the Lions mission everyday can be blind to the reality that without the occasional reminder public memory of Lions and our mission can fade, like the paint on old Lions signs forgotten on the side of the road. So this year make an effort to put together a legacy project. It can be nearly anything. Some of the examples LCI suggest run from the profound and complex; like developing a community center or building a school to refurbishing a park. Then there are some more manageable, yet generous suggestions; like donating a vehicle to a cause. Or even simple but effective; like replacing a rusty old Lions sign so our communities know we are still here and ready to help. So ask around the club and zone. Not every club might have one, but you won't know until you ask. If you don't have any, keep that in mind as you drive through your community. Can you find a spot you and your club can mount one? A simple little set up is all it takes to remind those we serve we are still here.

If you do have one, take a half hour to run out and see what condition it's in. How does it look? Is it rusty or faded? Is it blocked or overgrown? Give it a little TLC or replace it. It's been hard at work getting the word out, probably for decades. Show our signs a little love and they will help ensure our legacy for generations to come.

The Bionic Woman

Do you remember the 1970's TV show The Bionic Woman? Well, we have our very own bionic woman living right here in Southeastern Virginia. Allow me to introduce Lion Karen Brown of the Virginia Beach Town Center – Blind Lions Club. Lion Karen is participating in a research study

of the Argus II, also known as the bionic eye, at Duke Eye Center in North Carolina. Karen's journey began In October 2015, when she visited her local eye doctor for her first eye exam after a ten year hiatus. She jokingly asked, "So what's new to help me see?" To her surprise, the doctor told her about the new Argus® II Retinal Prosthesis System. The Argus II is intended to provide electrical stimulation of the retina to induce visual perception in blind individuals. A miniature video camera housed in the patient's glasses captures a scene. The video is sent to a small patient-worn computer where it is processed and transformed into instructions that are sent back to the glasses via a cable. These instructions are transmitted wirelessly to an antenna in the retinal implant. The signals are then sent to the electrode array, which emits small pulses of electricity. These pulses bypass damaged photoreceptors and stimulate the retina's remaining cells, which transmit the visual information along the optic nerve to the brain, creating the perception of patterns of light. The doctor went on to explain that patients with Retinitis Pigmentosa (RP) are ideal candidates since they once had vision. Karen was very interested to learn more about the bionic eye so she visited Duke Eye Center where she underwent extensive visual testing to see if she qualified for the study. Researchers were also seeking individuals who possess strong mobility and daily living skills so the device could be tested in a variety of settings. Throughout her life Karen met these criteria by maintaining employment for 36 years with the Norfolk Naval Station Base Police Department; walking daily with her fourth guide dog, Holly; maintaining her household; not to mention all her volunteerism with the Lions. Karen admits it wasn't an easy decision to participate in the program after learning more about the potential health risks and financial obligations related to the implant. At the time, her private insurance wasn't covering the costs of the procedure so her hopes were quickly dashed. However, in January 2016 her insurance began covering the procedure but the co-pay was still out of reach and additional travel expenses would be incurred through numerous trips to Duke Eye Center for occupational therapy. Friends, family and even strangers joined together to help Karen realize her dream by donating funds on her go-fund-me account to cover driver travel expenses. In February 2016, Karen underwent surgery to place 60 electrodes on the back of the white of her left eye and implant the antenna behind her retina. The surgery went well with a relatively short recovery time. In March she returned to Duke Eye Center for the Argus II to be turned on for the first time. Immediately, she could tell one of the staff members was wearing a light colored top and when she walked down the hall she could identify the contrast between the different types of flooring. Since then, she began occupational therapy to help train her brain how to interpret the visual patterns from her retinal implant. It can take up to a year for Karen to learn how to fully utilize the information from her bionic eye. Currently, she is occasionally able to identify an outline of a few objects placed on a high contrast placemat and the outline of a doorway from a short distance. Therapists are working with her to learn to identify a person standing in front of her. To someone who hasn't seen anything for years, these are definitely steps forward and provide hope to all of us. Karen said, "If I benefit from the implant I'll be thrilled; but my true purpose is to help provide feedback that will help improve the implant for others in the future." Lion Karen is exemplifying one of our lions' objectives "Sharing the Vision" with others. Lion Karen would be happy to speak to your club if you'd like to hear more about her journey.
